HERESY RETURNS FOR A NINTH SERIES ON BBC RADIO 4

VICTORIA COREN-MITCHELL returns to BBC Radio 4 this spring to present a brand new series of <u>Heresy</u> which sees popular prejudices overthrown and received opinions ruthlessly examined. The new six-part series will air from 16th May 2013.

Each week VICTORIA will be joined by a panel drawn from Britain's wittiest and most outspoken broadcasters, comedians, writers and performers as they discuss everyday assumptions we all take for granted, mixing verbal dexterity with irreverent humour.

Topics from the worlds of news, sport, popular culture, politics and the arts are all potential targets for the full <u>Heresy</u> treatment. Episode one of the new series sees the panel of esteemed guests – LEE MACK, GERMAINE GREER and DAVID SCHNEIDER, discussing whether tennis ace Andy Murray is a lot more likable than he used to be, is maths a more worthwhile subject than media studies and are foxes a pest. Future episodes cover topics such as whether there should be horsemeat in a beef lasagne, whether video games should be an Olympic sport and are voyages to Mars a credit to human endeavour.

Show creator and former host, DAVID BADDIEL will be one of VICTORIA's guests during the series, while other heretics lined up include: DAVID MITCHELL, SUE PERKINS, GILES COREN, ALEX HORNE, RICHARD OSMAN, MILES JUPP, BRIDGET CHRISTIE and MARK STEEL. VICTORIA COREN-MITCHELL

VICTORIA COREN-MITCHELL writes a weekly column for *The Observer* and a bi-monthly column for *GQ*, presents the BBC4 quiz show <u>Only Connect</u> and plays poker as a member of PokerStars Team Pro UK.

Aged 14, inspired by lonely Jo March from Little Women, VICTORIA submitted a short story to *Just Seventeen* magazine under an assumed name. The story was accepted and published, earning her the princely sum of £90. Hooked on trade immediately, VICTORIA answered a nationwide appeal from the *Daily Telegraph* for a teenage columnist (her 'audition column' was about the terrors of the countryside for an urban child), got the job and wrote for them weekly for four years.

A collection of VICTORIA's teenage newspaper articles was published in 1990. After university, she became a freelance journalist and broadcaster. In 1999, VICTORIA adapted the newspaper columns of John Diamond into a play <u>A Lump In My Throat</u>, which was performed at The Grace Theatre and The New End Theatre in London and The Assembly Rooms in Edinburgh, before VICTORIA re-adapted it into a TV play for BBC2 starring Neil Pearson.

VICTORIA is also a professional poker player, 2006 winner of the *London EPT*, sponsored to play tournaments by PokerStars.com, playing on the international poker circuit and regularly on Channel 4 and Sky Sports. More details and tournament results on the 'poker' page.

As a broadcaster, she has presented <u>Fourth Column</u> and <u>Off The Page</u> for Radio 4 and two series of <u>Balderdash And Piffle</u> (about the Oxford dictionary and the history of words) for BBC2, as well as documentaries on language and surrealist art for BBC4. As a poker and gambling specialist, she has presented <u>Late Night Poker</u> and <u>The Poker Nations Cup</u> for Channel 4, a series of <u>World Poker Tour</u> for ITV2 and the chat show <u>Bar Beat</u> for the Poker Channel, as well as providing commentary for <u>The European Poker Tour</u> and <u>The Grosvenor UK Poker Tour</u> (Channel 4), <u>Ultimate Poker Challenge</u> (Channel 5), <u>Celebrity Poker Challenge</u> (ITV1), <u>The William Hill Grand Prix</u> (Sky Sports), <u>Celebrity Poker Club</u> and <u>Casino Casino</u> (Challenge TV).

She has also appeared as a guest on <u>Question Time</u>, <u>Have I Got News For You</u>, <u>You Have Been Watching</u>, <u>The Bubble</u>, <u>Loose Ends</u>, <u>Midweek</u>, <u>Woman's Hour</u> and various other short-term experiments; that kind of thing comes up on the 'news' page of this site unless there is a good reason to hide it.



In 2002, VICTORIA disappeared into the X-rated film industry with her best friend Charlie Skelton and they wrote a book about it, <u>Once More With Feeling</u>.

In 2008, with her brother Giles, she co-edited an anthology of their father's writing, <u>Chocolate</u> And Cuckoo Clocks.

In 2009, VICTORIA's memoir of a life playing cards, <u>For Richer, For Poorer: A Love Affair With Poker</u>, was published by Canongate, then re-published in paperback in 2011 as <u>For Richer</u>, For Poorer: Confessions Of A Player.
